ACCREDITATION

In recognition of Concordia University of Edmonton's degree-granting status, the Association of Universities and Colleges of Canada accepted Concordia University of Edmonton into membership in 1990.

PROGRAM HISTORY

Founded in 1921, Concordia University of Edmonton offers students a university education on the foundation of faith and intellectual integrity. Concordia University of Edmonton's original purpose was to prepare young men for ministries of the Lutheran Church; co-education, general courses of study, and provincially accredited programs were introduced in 1939.

Under the authority of the Universities Act, Concordia University of Edmonton (CUE) became a degree-granting institution in 1987, offering three-year baccalaureate degrees in Arts and Science. The Government of Alberta has since approved the following programs at CUE: four-year Arts degrees in 1994; a Bachelor of Education (After Degree) in 1995; four-year Science degrees in 1997; a Bachelor of Environmental Health (After Degree) in 2001; a Bachelor of Management degree in 2003; a Master of Information Systems Security Management degree in 2005; a Master of Arts in Biblical and Christian Studies degree in 2008; a Master of Information Systems Assurance Management in 2012, and a Master of Education in Educational Leadership in 2018.

CUE offers undergraduate and graduate certificate and diploma programs, as well as various non-credit extension courses and an English for Academic Purposes language upgrading program. Until 2014, CUE also offered University and College Entry Programs (UCEP).

NAME

Prior to May 2015, Concordia University of Edmonton was called Concordia University College of Alberta. And prior to December 1995, it was called Concordia College.

TRANSCRIPT FORMATS

Concordia issues transcripts in the following formats:

- 1) **Official Copies:** Transcripts prior to September 1985 and some from the period 1985 to 1995 are copies of original or archived documents that Concordia validates as official with an original signature and raised seal.
- 2) **Original Documents:** Transcripts from the academic year 1995-1996 and some from the period 1985 to 1995 may be printed on original security paper. Concordia University of Edmonton introduced this format in May 1996.
- 3) **Combination of Official Copies and Original Documents:** Students from both time periods may present

official transcripts in both formats. However, Concordia University of Edmonton uses one format whenever possible.

AWARDS

In May 2004, Concordia University of Edmonton began including on transcripts major academic scholarships and awards conferred on students beginning with the academic year 2000-2001. COURSE NUMBERING effective September 1990

- 00-99 UCEP courses (do not count toward degree programs) until 2014. Non-credit extension courses effective 2019
- 100-199 junior-level courses, normally taken by first-year students
- 200-399 senior-level courses open to students with at least second-year standing (18 credits or more)
- 400-499 senior-level courses for students completing Concordia University of Edmonton degrees, normally taken in the third or fourth year of undergraduate studies
- 500-599 master's degree courses and senior-level courses open only to students admitted to an after-degree program
- 600-699 master's degree courses and senior-level courses open only to students with an applicable degree and other required qualifications

COURSE NUMBERING prior to September 1990

- 00-99 UCEP courses (do not count toward degree programs) and some junior-level courses
- 200-299 Junior-level courses normally taken by first-year students
- 300-499 Senior-level courses open to students with a minimum of 18 credits

CREDIT VALUE

The credit value indicates the weight of the course used for calculating the Grade Point Average and for meeting degree requirements. Normally, 1.5- and 3-credit courses are completed at the end of one semester and 6-credit courses at the end of the academic year (two semesters).

GRADE POINT AVERAGE

Grade points are calculated by multiplying the Grade Point Value for each grade by the number of attempted credits for the course. The Grade Point Average (GPA) is obtained by dividing the total number of grade points earned by the total number of attempted credits. Of the non-numeric *Other Final Grades*, only the grade of WF is calculated into the Grade Point Average.
